Whether it is in agricultural mechanics, livestock evaluation, or a dozen other areas of learning, the Missouri Agricultural Skills and Knowledge Assessment Industry Recognized Credential (MOASK IRC) program recognizes students performing at a proficient level as determined by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE).

The technical skills assessments are conducted much like FFA judging events, but the results are used to determine a student's proficiency and not for competitive award purposes. The program compliments the three circle model for delivering agricultural education in schools. The circles represent learning in the classroom, leadership development through the FFA and hands on training through each student's Supervised Agricultural Experience. Sponsors Missouri Farm Bureau and the Missouri Farm Bureau Foundation for Agriculture are proud to partner with DESE and take an active role in the program. County Farm Bureau leaders are responsible for verifying the rigor of each event, ensuring requirements are met and providing certificates for students deemed proficient. "Ultimately, we want to add value to the experiences our youth gain through agriculture education," said Jones. "We believe these credentials will benefit students as they pursue higher education and/or vocational training, apply for scholarships and ultimately enter the workforce."

SENIOR AG INDUSTRY TOUR

04/19/17

On April 19, 2017, senior students from the Chillicothe High School had the opportunity for career exploration. Twenty-five CHS seniors who have an agriculture career pathway traveled to Show-Me Ethanol of Carrollton and Quixotic Fish Farm of Chillicothe, MO.

Show Me Ethanol LLC produces approximately 60 million gallon of fuel grade ethanol annually. They produce ethanol through a dry mill process that includes fermentation, processing and distillation. The ethanol is primarily blended in E10 and E85 gasoline throughout the Midwest. Show Me Ethanol also produces and markets two types of feed as well as a feed grade corn oil. DDGS are primarily fed to poultry, swine and cattle and is approximately 90% dry matter; and MWDGS that is fed to cattle and is approximately 48% dry material.



Quixotic Farming is a family-owned, environmentally conscious company that raises Tilapia without the use of hormones or antibiotics. The fish eat a nutrient-rich diet and thrive in covered tanks where their living conditions are monitored around the clock and their water is constantly being filtered and recirculated. Quixotic Farming produces high quality tilapia using RAS or a re-circulating aquaculture system. The tanks are also equipped with aeration systems to provide optimal levels of oxygen for the fish. The aeration system provides healthy, oxygenated water that keeps the fish happy and energized. The improved oxygen level encourages more activity and better feed conversions, which helps the growth rate of our fish. The students were given the opportunity to tour each of these facilities and ask questions regarding the career opportunities available in the respected fields. We would like to thank both facilities for allowing the students to tour as well as providing them with a wealth of knowledge.

Ag Issues March 21, 2017

On Tuesday, March 21, 2017, the Chillicothe FFA Agricultural Issues Forum team presented to the Chillicothe R-II School Board at the Chillicothe R-II School Administrative Building. The purpose of the Agricultural Issues Forum is to provide students an opportunity to explore local agriculture issues and create an unbiased presentation to a public audience. The ability to understand and communicate clearly with the public about agriculture is important to the career success of students and to the agriculture industry. Chillicothe FFA Chapter has chosen for their Agriculture Issues forum, "Should the Next Farm Bill Include More Funding for the Conservation Reserve Program?" The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is a land conservation program administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA). In exchange for a yearly rental payment, farmers enrolled in the program agree to remove environmentally sensitive land from agricultural production and plant species that will improve environmental health and quality. Contracts for land enrolled in CRP are 10-15 years in length. The long-term goal of the program is to reestablish valuable land cover to help improve water quality, prevent soil erosion, and reduce loss of wildlife habitat. Signed into law by President Ronald Reagan in 1985, CRP is the largest private-lands conservation program in the United States. Thanks to voluntary participation by farmers and land owners, CRP has improved water quality, reduced soil erosion, and increased habitat for endangered and threatened species. In 2007, CRP peaked at 36.8 million acres enrolled, and by the fall of 2015, it was down to 24.2 million acres, its smallest size since the 1980's. Most recently, given the newest farm bill, the number of acres accepted in the Conservation Reserve Program was cut from 40 million to the current 24 million.



The Agriculture Issues Forum team has also presented previously to the Livingston County Farm Bureau Board, the Chillicothe Agri-Leaders, Chillicothe Rotary Club, Chillicothe Young Farmers, and the KMZU Farmer Appreciation dinner. The team received first place at the area level and will compete at the district level on March 28, 2017.
