

STATE FARMERS

This year the Chillicothe Chapter is again fortunate to have four of its members receive the State Farmer Degree. They are John Meneely, Jim Popham, Bob Smith and Danny Williams.

The degree is given to a boy who has shown outstanding leadership and cooperation. He must also be familiar with the provisions of the State Constitution and have an outstanding supervised farming program.

John's supervised farming program consists of 10 beef cows, 4 beef heifers, 1 beef bull, 6 fattening steers, 3 dairy cows and calves. 12 sows and litters, 10 feeder pigs. 60 acres of wheat, 100 acres of soybeans, 50 acres of corn, 10 acres of alfalfa, and 4 acres of improved pasture.

Jim's supervised farming program consists of 12 sows and litters, 10 cows and calves, 2 beef bulls, 4 beef heifers, 6 fattening steers, and 10 acres of corn.

Bob's supervised farming program consists of 2 beef cows and calves. 1 mare and colt. He owns 50% of the following: 1 beef bull, 1 beef heifer, 7 dairy cows and calves, 1 dairy heifers, 10 acres of corn, and 16 acres of oats.

Danny's supervised farming program consists of 4 beef cows, 2 beef heifers, 100 acres of corn, 145 acres of soybeans, and 171/2 acres of wheat.

The State Farmer Degree is based not only on their supervised farming project but also on leadership. These boys certainly possess these qualities. As evidence of these qualities, each boy holds a Chapter office. This is the first time that this chapter has had four State Farmers the same year.
